


The tendency of group registrations since 2009 is a decrease in number of participants particularly between 2011 and 2012. For 2013 the number hasn't decreased but remained stable.

Germany remains number 1 in terms of number of delegates. Netherlands comes into 2nd position with 1 367 registered delegates, versus number 10th in 2012 with 660 delegates: this clearly shows the impact of the hosting country.

The following countries have significantly increased their participation compared to 2012: France & Brazil (+255), UK (+199), Turkey (+161) and the USA (+143 participants).


It is also important to note that the Chinese delegation augmented from 654 delegates in 2012 to 948 in 2013 representing a 45% increase. Canada has made it in the top 30 this year.

Finally, the fact that 8 countries in the top 30 are non ESC Member countries reinforces the global reach of ESC Congress.


Profile information this year is based on 66% of active delegates.

General Cardiology Track for Physicians, Nurses and Technicians

Took place all day Saturday (Room Chisinau - Central Village).

A general cardiology update programme designed to update healthcare professionals as an introduction to the ESC Congress 2013. The sessions, revolving around real case scenarios were discussed by panels of experts. This programme was organised in conjunction with the ESC Council for Cardiology Practice, the ESC Council on Cardiovascular Primary Care and the ESC Council on Cardiovascular Nursing and Allied Professions. There was a special one day registration fee of $\mathfrak E$ 50 for Nurses, technicians, physician (with a proof of their status).

Cardiac Anato & Pathology Session – LIVE Specimens Demonstration

Held this year in Village 8 – room Stockholm (no longer a separate room) The room was set up with a demo stand, camera and large screen.

The HUB in Central Village

3 round stages surrounded by plasma screens were built and used as new kinds of lecture rooms:

Room Tunis: 200 seatsRoom Baku: 100 seatRoom Minsk: 100 seats


The whole area called "the Hub" was designed to facilitate exchange and interaction between presenters, delegates and the chairpersons.





Most sessions held in the hub were Clinical cases sessions from the ESC Cardiologists of Tomorrow and Rapid Fire" oral abstract presentations: fast paced and interactive sessions presenting key messages of ten abstracts and continued around the plasma screens.

Levels of satisfaction with The Hub sessions



Awareness of interactive sessions in The Hub in high, with just over 95% of respondents having heard of them.

A sizeable segment of 9.4% of cardiology professionals are choosing not to attend the. Attendance decreases by age with 18.6% of 61 –74 year olds choosing not to attend the sessions compared to just 5.6% of 21 –30 year olds.


Abstract Programme

Overall numbers

10 491 abstracts were submitted for ESC 2013 and 4 215 accepted. For both submissions and acceptances these are the second highest number, after the Paris Congress in 2011. The overall acceptance rate is 40.18% which is in the range of previous years, but higher than 2011.



NEW in Abstract-based Programme



RAPID FIRE Asbstract Sessions

These sessions were held in a newly designed area "The Hub" in Central Village.

Fast paced and interactive sessions presenting key messages of ten abstracts (60 minutes) and continued outside the room with presenters , delegates and the chairpersons animating more indepth discussion on the interpretation and findings on plasma screens (abstract key slide available) for 30 minutes.

Each presenter had 5 minutes to present key results (maximum 5 slides – no multiple builds) during the presentation in the room. Time permitting the chairs could ask for clarification on the oral presentation but the main discussions took place in the second part.

This new format was very well perceived and attendance in Rapid Fire Session was significantly higher than the attendance we usually have in traditional Abstract Sessions.

Traditional Abstract Sessions were held in the villages.

Traditional Posters

The Poster area was set up by mediAVentures. Poster boards were hung from the ceiling as last year. The submission topic was indicated on each poster board.



A Poster session was held on Saturday afternoon, then two sessions per day, Monday to Tuesday. No poster session on Wednesday morning.

Moderated Poster Session

Two simultaneous Moderated Poster sessions were held at each coffee break from Saturday afternoon until Tuesday afternoon

The Moderated Poster Presenters had a traditional poster display (for the entire Poster session duration) and presented on large plasma screen for their oral presentation.

Call-4Posters: The participants had the opportunity to quickly and easily create a professional poster online and the convenience of having the poster delivered on-site at the meeting via the Call4Posters® service. The supplier, Marathon received 257 posters orders out of the total of 3 470.

> e-Posters

Authors of traditional posters were invited to submit their posters electronically. These posters were accessible for electronic consultation on Congress 365 in the several 365 stations available in the congress centre (ESC Plaza / Central Village The Hub / Poster Area).

1 315 posters were submitted as an e-Poster this year.


Abstract Embargo

A few figures from the market research

For the 3rd year a market research was held during the Congress, by an independent market research company, asking delegates a series of questions.

The market research was based on a significantly representative sample of more than 2 000 interviewees from 146 countries representing the ESC Congress audience.

Level of satisfaction with the scientific programme:

The results obtained show that ESC Congress delegates are highly satisfied with the programme:

Despite these positive results, again this year, we can see that the satisfaction about the Scientific Programme, the Range of topics covered and the choice of speakers are less strong.

The overall results throughout the market research tend to be less positive than in previous years. The problems arising around the lines in registration and the shortage of final programmes/congress bags seems to have affected the respondents' perception and level of satisfaction.

As noticed for the scientific programme, scientists were also less satisfied with the range of topics at the congress. Further research could be useful here to determine what topics the research community would like to see at the congress.


Interactive sessions in The Hub:

Awareness of interactive sessions in The Hub was high, with just over 95% of respondents having heard of them. Although satisfaction was very high (98%), a sizeable segment of 9.4% of cardiology professionals were choosing not to attend them (especially North American (15%) & Europeans (12%). Intention to attend decreased with age.

Tracks within the scientific content

For the first year, a specific question on tracks was introduced in the survey: which of these tracks would be of most interest to you at this year's congress?

As expected, the three most popular tracks of interest varied by category of audience: 63% of cardiologists were interested in the GIP track, 53% of trainee cardiologists were interested in the CoT track, 53% of scientists were interested in the SP track.




A number of other tracks of interest were mentioned, the most popular of which was a General cardiology track that was mentioned across all demographic sectors.

How could the scientific content be improved?

"More practical sessions" was the most popular suggestion for improvement to ESC congress, with nearly half of all respondents expressing a desire for this.

Despite ESC efforts to bring more interactivity to the programme (e.g. The Hub), this remains the number one suggestion and further efforts will be needed for the years to come in order to provide even more interactivity to the delegates.



It seems feasible that the ESC may be able to replace a reasonably large percentage of the
paper programme with an electronic version, it will be important to still include provision of
a paper version to ensure that the needs of all delegates are met.

Infrastructure Changes for 2013

According to the feedback collected the year before and due to the success of this initiative at EuroEcho 2012, we took the deliberate decision to move towards a less paper-intensive congress by implementing the following changes:

- Self-service distribution (i.e. no more group pick-up for industry)
- Number of congress bags reduced from 25 000 to 15 00
- Number of final programmes reduced from 25 000 to 10 000
- Other handouts (e.g. industry programme) reduced from 25 000 to 15 000
- Number of documents reduced from 14 to 6

Unfortunately, this could not cope with the massive and unexpectedly high number of people arriving on Saturday, so a significant number of delegates were frustrated about the queues and in some cases the fact that the programmes had run out. So the information collected in the 2012 survey proves that although delegates seem willing to withdraw from the paper, they act differently.

Plan for 2014

- Maintain a drive towards a less paper-intensive congress
- As in 2013, maintain the number of handouts to the minimum
- Pre-filled the bags and distribute them to each individual, i.e. no more self-service
- However, go back to 25 000 final programmes which prove to be complementary to the mobile app
- Re-introduce group pick-up for industry prior to opening, for delivery in hotels or from industry welcome desks

A few elements from the market research

Respondents were generally satisfied with the venue (78%), although levels of satisfaction with the ICM Messe in Munich were higher (90%).



These results may be a reflection of organisational/navigational issues:

- Some had difficulty finding meeting rooms.
- The levels within the Amsterdam RAI made it difficult for some respondents to fully understand how to navigate the congress while using the ESC map. In addition there appeared to be little navigational support during the first full day of the congress.
- Long corridors connecting the halls of the congress may also be a factor on comfort.

Delegates also expressed frustration over the logistics. The key arising themes were:

- Trains: Infrequent trains on Sunday. Long waits for trains, reports of up to 1 hour.
- Signposting: Lack of signposting on where to find public transport.
- Taxis not easy to use.
- Lack of transport from the hotel. A particular issue for those further away from the venue.



These aspects largely remain consistent with previous results from the 2 previous years.

Increase the reliability of the internet connection, offer free water and provide more seating – these were the top 3 suggestions for improving delegate comfort.

It is interesting to note, the numbers for these 3 areas remain almost identical to those from the results in Munich.

Young Community Corner

In response to the increase of the young communities within ESC Constituent Bodies, this year, a whole Corner on the ESC Stand was dedicated to our younger volunteers.

The **Young Community Corner** promoted the activities of the ESC Cardiologists of Tomorrow, EACVI Club 35, Young EAPCI and Scientists of Tomorrow groups. All ESC activities were also promoted such as grants, awards, contact details of national young groups, information on activities for young cardiologists during the ESC Congress 2013...

358 young cardiologists visited the Corner to collect their "Youth Pack": a bag with a free set of ESC Clinical Practice Guidelines, brochure on the ESC Education offer, CoT flyer and the CoT pin's to be recognised by their peers during the Congress.

A meeting area had been set up behind the corner where young cardiologists and young group leaders could meet and welcome their colleagues visiting the Corner. The ESC Young Community showed a big interest in collaborating to represent the next generations of ESC volunteers.

This year, meetings were organised between young national leaders, CoT nucleus members and chairs from young sub-specialties groups to reinforce their links and start working closely together. In this spirit, an article has been published in the ESC Congress News on Saturday.

Scientific affairs on the stand

> Education

Educational activities' promotion was organised this year around 2 main areas: the Education Corner on the ESC Stand, the ESCeL Demo Point located between the ESC Stand and the National Societies zone.

Education Corner on ESC Stand



The **interactive touch screen** piloted last year was available in an enhanced format allowing optimal dissemination of the Educational offering (content presented by topic and sent by email to delegate).

All ESC educational activities were promoted:

- ESC eLearning platform available for members of the 6 ESC Associations. Educational content in development for General Cardiology.
- ESC webinar launch of the 2013-2014 season of Webinars in General Cardiology (Free of charge, ESC Practice Guidelines based, Studio format)
- Educational training programmes (ETPs)
- Continuing Education and Training Catalogue, along with other printed material, were handed to interested delegates.

ESCeL Demo Point

Last year was the discovery phase of the newly launched ESCeL platform. Communication strategy was aiming at raising interest, increasing visibility and awareness.

This year's objective was to consolidate awareness and



provide practical demonstration to current and future users: trainees, trainers and also national administrators.



1 single Demo area was available this year (compared to 6 last year).

More than **240 participants** were scanned at the Demo area and were presented with the ESCeL Platform in their relevant field of interest.



EHRA launched a first series of 32 courses with 160 MCQs during Congress and 15 EHRA Members registered onsite to this brand new programme.

Forthcoming educational programmes in General Cardiology were also promoted and raised a lot of interest;

Other activities during congress

- The traditional bi-annual **MCQ review meeting** in general cardiology took place as scheduled, emphasising the increasing need for MCQs as ESC content repurposing and self-assessment is on the rise.
- Delivery of the **EACVI TTE paper based examination** within the Congress Facility (119 candidates)
- A series of **meetings** with the Education Chairman, Committee Members and when appropriate Global Port (Eric Delente Supplier ESCeL) about Case-based Learning, Question Authoring System, ESCeL General Cardiology...and more!

ESC Pocket Guidelines available for free in the ESC Pocket Guidelines Application

The new Application gives access to the electronic version of all 2011 and 2012 ESC Pocket Guidelines as well as to over 40 dedicated interactive tools, all in



one App! The new ESC Pocket Guidelines App will change your daily practice by providing quick access to 10 Pocket guidelines such as VHD, AF, STEMI, HF... It is available for Apple and Android devices. During the opening days of the congress, there were more than **26 400** downloads of the iPhone & android versions of the App.



Over 24 000 paper versions of the Pocket Guidelines (Arterial Hypertension, Cardiac Pacing and CRT, Diabetes, Pre-diabetes & CVD, and Stable Coronary Artery Disease) were given out to the ESC Members on a first come, first served basis. The paper versions of these 2013 Pocket Guidelines were also distributed at the Cardiologists of Tomorrow (COT) desk and in the Fellows lounge.



Free "CVD in Diabetes Summary Card for General Practice" and its associated "Essential Messages" were given out to all interested ESC Guidelines' Corner visitors.

Activities on the stand also include providing information on Guidelines related activities, to familiarise visitors with the ESC Guidelines web pages and promote the wide range of the ESC Guidelines derivative educational products.

The ESC Guidelines were also highlighted and promoted during the **ESC Cardiology Quiz.** Delegations from three different renowned cardiology centres were in competition to correctly answer a series of questions and tests about different topics. **Mainly driven by a didactic review of the ESC Guidelines**, the quiz focused on the most interesting, the most polemic or the most recently updated issues.

The Guidelines were also involved the "Guidelines into Practice track". Multiple resources and presentations were made available in a simple click. This track is designed to guide cardiologists directly to valuable information from top experts to facilitate the implementation of the Guidelines into their daily practice.

Finally the ESC Clinical Practice Guidelines were also very present in most social networks, such as with Guidelines presentations posted on "Youtube". Twitter was used extensively during the congress, covering key messages related to Guidelines sessions.





The ESC has welcomed a 56th National Cardiac Society voted during the Congress and announced at the General Assembly: **the Kyrgyz Society of Cardiology**.

The **51 National Cardiac Societies stands** (vs 49 NCS stands in 2012) were very well located in the ESC Plaza right after the ESC Stand, next to the Exhibition Hall.

Many National Cardiac Societies were well represented with the presence of national representatives, posters, brochures, slideshows on plasma screens and other promotional items.

This year, a map was given in the ESC Plaza to give a better visibility on the location of each NCS to help the delegates find the NCS of their interest.

Affiliated Cardiac Societies Display Stand

This year, again the Affiliated Cardiac Societies corner gave a great visibility to the **38 Affiliated Cardiac Societies**. A lounge was set up allowing Affiliated Cardiac Societies to display their brochures, a poster, meet and network in the seating area.

12 countries were represented: Canada, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Macau, Malaysia, Oman, Singapore, South Africa, Sudan, Taiwan and Thailand.

5 stand packages were offered to Affiliated Cardiac Societies holding a Joint Session during ESC Congress 2013 or having an ESC Global Scientific Activity organised on the occasion of their annual congress.

EXHIBITION, INDUSTRY SPONSORED SESSIONS, SPONSORSHIP & ADVERTISEMENT

Industry was very active at ESC Congress 2013 occupying almost 8 392 m² of space including 21 first time exhibitors, organising over 71 sessions and supporting multiple delegate products and services.


Exhibition

At the ESC Congress 2013 in Amsterdam, the Exhibition Area occupied a total of 10 198 m^2 for 206 exhibit spaces and was concentrated in Exhibition (Halls 1 & 6), and ESC Plaza / International Associations area (Halls 2 & 3).

The Exhibition (Halls 1 & 6) was dedicated to the commercial area with our Industry Partners' stands, Publishers and ETSA area. These 2 halls were centrally located. The Exhibition was on the passageway to the Focus Sessions and Posters area (Village 9) and Village 8, Cardiac Imaging & Cardiac Anatomy.

The non commercial area was located in a section of Hall 2 and in Hall 3. The ESC Plaza was dedicated to the National Cardiac Societies, Affiliated Cardiac Societies and ESC stands. The International Associations area was also located at the bottom of Hall 3, as well as the CPR Workshops initiative together with a delegate lounge and one catering area. This area was centrally located in the Congress centre close to the registration area offering optimal visibility for the ESC National & Affiliated Cardiac Societies.

> Comparison between Exhibitions: ESC Congress 2012 & ESC Congress 2013






> ESC Congresses from 2009 to 2013

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Workshops

Thanks to the help of the European Resuscitation Council, the European Society of Cardiology once again provided free CPR workshops for ESC Congress delegates, organised in partnership with ACCA (Acute Cardiac Care Association) and EHRA (European Heart Rhythm Association).



CME accreditation by **EBAC**



The industry information was also available in the "Maps" section of the ESC 2013 mobile application. The exhibition floor plans of the "ESC Plaza & International Associations" as well as the "Exhibition" were available there. When clicking on the map, each stand was identified with stand number & company name. A direct access to the company profile of each stand was available when clicking on the stand space. An exhibitor list by alphabetical order and a listing by stand numbers were also available to allow easy access to the location of an industry partner in the exhibition halls.



The opening of the exhibition at 15:00 on Saturday 31 August was promoted in the daily news of the app.

Some mobile app stations were located in the exhibition halls to allow delegates accessing industry information & congress programme on-site.

CONGRESS NEWS & PRESS

Congress Newspaper 2013

From the 31st of August to the 4th of September 2013, ESC Congress News 2013 was printed at 60 000 copies and distribute throughout the Congress. The team consisted of: Professor Michel Bertrand, Prof Doctor Marco Valgimigli, Simon Brown, Janet Fricker, Sophie Goodchild, Patrik Engstrom, Denis Garcia, and myself, Chloe Villaume. The newspaper was printed by Rodi Media.

Content

The majority of the news content for Congress News was decided after the Press Committee meeting in preparation of the ESC Congress.

The articles were written by Janet Fricker, Simon Brown and Sophie Goodchild and a selection of commissioned authors, most of whom are practicing cardiologists.

In these quantities, we need to keep in mind that a number of newspapers are delivered to a selection of 10 hotels, which decreases the number of papers actually delivered to the Congress Centre.

ESC Congress 2013 - Press Office

The Press Centre was a major information hub for media from across the world, to report on the scientific presentations and outcomes of the ESC Congress. The international press conferences and press book with releases, covered approximately 100 scientific sessions, considered to be of particular media interest. The ESC Press Office also arranged and facilitated interviews with ESC spokespersons and presenters and provided an extensive working space for reporters.

ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS

ESC Congress 2013 Mobile App



An upgraded version of the ESC Congress Mobile App (for iPhones, Android Phones, & iPad & Android tablets) was made available to all Congress delegates to disseminate ESC Congress scientific programme and general information easily to participants. The mobile app contained the entire scientific programme of the Congress, congress maps as well as other Congress general information & resources, ESC corporate information, information about the sponsor (SERVIER), and daily congress news. It offered various functionalities to congress delegates like daily bulletins pushed on mobile devices, interactive maps to locate exhibitors and sessions rooms, sessions objectives & abstracts available for consultation within the app, powerful search functionality throughout the congress scientific content, creation of personalised programme, to do lists, take notes of specific sessions and share these with colleagues. It helped provide more visibility/recognition to the sponsor and helped broaden the access to social networking platforms so as to eventually decrease the need for paper programmes on-site. The mobile app was available on the App Store and on Google Play (search for 'ESC 2013').




Synchronisation of the mobile app with ESC internal scientific programme software (SPM) for up to date scientific content

- Possibility for the user to synchronise his 'My Programme' with his programme in SPO/SPP (online on escardio.org) and with its device
- Possibility for the user to consult the resources of the presentations (slides, webcasts, reports via ESC Congress 365), directly from the app, from the presentation itself, no identification required (customer friendly)
- Notifications of elements added in personal programme 15 minutes before the event
- Push notifications
- Direct link to the #ESCCongress2013 Twitter feed
- 7 Mobile app stations: for delegates who did not bring the mobile device to consult the app on iPads available throughout the congress centre
- Various technical/presentation improvements
- The app was available in stores as early as July 2013 (1 month earlier than in 2012)

The mobile app was downloaded 18 171 times (+ 55.5% compared to 2012).

iPhones and iPads were largely used by our audience:

- 14 173 downloads (78%) on iOS devices,
- 9 176 downloads (51%) on iPhones.



18 171 downloads represent 61% of all congress delegates (including press and exhibitors) or 74% of physicians.

So we can say that about 3 out of 4 physicians downloaded the ESC Congress 2013 mobile app: a very good uptake!


On-site and throughout our congress market research all feedbacks on the mobile app were excellent with delegates rating the app as the best congress app they ever used!

Thanks to the communication made before the event, **44%** (about 8 000) of the 18 171 downloads were performed before the Congress start. This helped us reduce the traffic on the Wi-Fi during the Congress.

With the lack of final programmes, many delegates were pleased to be able to consult the entire programme as well as resources from the presentations via the mobile app.

Only 6% (compared to 15% in 2012) of our respondents did not own a "smart" mobile device with 54% owning an iPhone and 30% an iPad. This represents a great receptive audience for mobile services, including the ESC Congress mobile app.

The overall levels of satisfaction reached 72.7% of the audience. The frustrations due to the perceived reliability and stability of the Wi-Fi connection impacted the levels of satisfaction. Even though



great efforts were put into communications before the Congress to promote downloads beforehand, solutions to overcome the reliability and stability of the Wi-Fi on-site will need to be implemented in 2014.

ESC Congress 365 provides access to ESC Congress content (abstracts, slides, webcasts and reports) all year long, with the objective to:

- · Capitalise on ESC Congress content value
- Provide educational content from ESC Congress to a wider, global audience

- Disseminate the best of science for improved practices & awareness



Resources from ESC Congress 365 (Congress reports, Slides, webcasts) were displayed on the Home Page from the $1^{\rm st}$ day of the congress with a top banner encouraging visitors to use this tool.






94% of delegates indicated they would be accessing the ESC Congress 365 resources.

This resource has the potential to really engage the congress community and provide value beyond attendance. Given the high numbers of respondents suggesting they will access this platform after attending (48%), we should consider to encourage delegates to re-register for Barcelona and ensuring the 2014 registration page is sufficiently signposted and linked to within the resource.

Delegates were significantly more likely to use the platform to keep up-to-date more generally.


Respondents from Eastern Europe (37.2%) and South and Central America (38.1%) were significantly more likely to use ESC Congress 365 to support the diagnosis of patients and to create treatment

plans for patients and creation of guidelines. For these delegates, the ESC Congress 365 platform is particularly useful for clinical practice.

Daily e-Newsletter

5 editions of the Daily My ESC News were emailed to more than 90 000 people for each edition. The average open rate was around 21%, and the average click rate 5.6%.

A brand new template was used for the 2013 editions.



The average open rate was 22%, with an average 26% of those who opened the newsletter, clicking on content links. Whilst open rate was higher than in 2012 (20%), average click was down slightly (30% of opened mail in 2012 against 26% in 2013).

ESC TV

ESC Studio and ESC TV were grouped under one brand: ESC TV, with editors-in-chief Prof. Jeroen J. Bax and Prof. Steen D. Kristensen.

The videos are divided in two categories:

- ESC TV Science in Perspective: video reports of what happened at the ESC Congress
 - 4 Daily editions, published during the ESC Congress
 - 7 editions by Topic, published one week after the ESC Congress

Science in Perspective was sub-contracted to *Medical Productions*. The videos were shot by a team of professional video production. The team is roamed throughout the congress centre, to get the real "look & feel" of the ESC Congress.

• ESC TV Cardio Talk: interviews of cardiologists by cardiologists

Cardio Talk was sub-contracted to *mediAVentures*. The videos were shot in real TV studio conditions by a full team of professionals.

In total, 49 interviews were filmed throughout 4 days, 17 of which were published during or straight after the ESC Congress, because the content was directly linked to the ESC Congress.

Dedicated home page

A new dedicated and rethought web page was created with integration and easy access to Congress News, Congress Reports, ESC Press releases, Webcasts and videos.

Live sessions:

Live from ESC Congress is a video channel created for the ESC Congress 2013 on escardio.org. This channel was composed of streamed live sessions and recorded videos from Saturday 31 August 16:00 to Wednesday 4 September 13:00.

17 sessions have been chosen by Keith Fox, Congress Programme Committee Chairperson, to be live streamed. Between these "live sessions" a mix of promotional videos, ESC TV and webcasts chosen by congress division has been played.

The programme was the same from 8:00 to 20:00 as the one from 20:00 to 08:00. The only change was that the live became recordings during the night.

The "channel" has been displayed on three different pages in escardio.org:

- "Live from ESC Congress" page.





> Social Media

This year, the activity on Social Media and especially on Twitter was astonishingly high. Extensive promotion of the hash tag #esccongress2013 has been done ahead and during the Congress.

For the second year in a row, a reporter tweeted LIVE from the sessions. A group of Dutch medical students was also involved in this process and encouraged to retweet our messages and raise awareness about the Congress on Twitter.


During the congress we had:

- Over **20 000** tweets about ESC Congress 2013 (official and non official hash tags)
- **10 293** tweets using the official hash tag (**1 500** in 2012)
- **775** tweets were sent via our official account (ESC web team + live reporter)
- **3 172** retweets of our messages
- On average, out tweets have reached **19 000** people (the top being 65 000!)

Our twitter account was also used to promote new sessions, ESC Congress 365, Congress reports, Best of ESC...

This year, we noted a lot more interactions with our delegates. They didn't hesitate to ask us direct questions and post comments about their congress experience

Facebook was used to display pictures from the Congress. The album contains **344 pictures** and received **8 400** clicks, **582** likes and **109** shares.


The most successful video during congress was "ESC TV 2013 - Hot Line II: PRAMI, ACCOAST, and LINC part 1". The most successful video after the congress was the recording of "Best of ESC Congress 2013".

The promotion of ESC TV on the website homepage, the Congress Home page, in ESC Congress 365, on Facebook, Twitter as well as in the Daily Congress News e-campaigns has resulted in a larger number than normal of views during the congress.

A few figures from the market research

53.2% of the respondents indicated they would use some sort of social media to share their congress experiences. This compares with 55% in 2012 and 28% in 2011.


It is interesting to note, while use of social media did increase significantly between 2011 and 2012, it has fallen slightly in 2013. This may suggest current activity has not been sufficiently engaging or providing sufficient value for delegates.



Again, Facebook was the most popular social media service with 29.8% of respondents mentioning this (as compared to Google+ which was mentioned by half as many respondents). LinkedIn use increased slightly to 10% (from 8.4% in 2012).

Social media used by territory:


What social media, if any, have you / will you use to share your ESC 2013 Congress experience with colleagues and peers?



Social media use varied by territory with North America, Southern Europe and Northern Europe much less likely to use it than their peers in other territories. This corroborates previous findings that SCA, EE and AP delegates demonstrate higher levels of social media engagement.

Social media use in this context is much higher amongst under 30s, with 88.9% of them sharing congress experience via social media. They are also far more likely to be using Facebook to do this, with nearly 53.2% using this social media tool.

Use of Twitter has increased from 6% to just under 10%, with the majority of this use led by those under 40.







Respondents were asked their preferences for congress programme delivery – in this iteration of the questionnaire we asked respondents to only choose 1 option.






32.7% of respondents suggested they would prefer for the congress programme to be delivered through a mobile app which did not require an internet connection.

Those that were under the age of 50 were significantly more likely to express a preference for the programme to be delivered in this format, with 41% of those under the age of 30 choosing to receive information in this way compared to 29.4% of those between the ages of 51-60 and 15.2% of those aged 61 and above respectively.

We also had questions on the preferred way to receive congress announcements, updates and general information.

There was a slight increase from last year in terms of preference for social media as a channel, from 3.9% to 6.6%.

The frequency remains the same as last year: every month or as soon as a new deadline / new feature comes up.

With close to 17 000 views in total, the promotional videos represented a very valuable additional communication tool. ESC appears to be continuing to develop a reputation of innovation and excellence in this area. The new tone in these videos and the omnipresent human aspect engaged the various audiences.

Addressing the request for more programme availability online and with a sense of social responsibility and cost saving, congress publications were made available online.

The Advance Programme was only available online and a flyer was produced to promote it.

There were an impressive number of page views and visits both in the Advance and Final Programme.

Market research

For the third year, a market research was held on-site by Shift learning.

The objective of this survey was to better understand the needs of those attending the congress, with this research being used to directly inform future congress design and marketing activities. 16 field researchers were present at the congress from Saturday until Tuesday with a red t-shirt. Respondents were incentivised with a free coffee voucher to take part in the survey.

We included results along this report, here are a general overview of the market. As the industry strategy is changing, we asked delegates about their funding of congress attendance and their intentions for ESC Congress 2014.

Funding Congress attendance, market opportunities

The proportion of respondents paying for their own registration rose from 17.2% to 20.8%. There was a drop in those whose registration was paid for by industry, from 55.3% to 51.2%. Patterns relating to payment of travel and accommodation were similar.

- Industry funding for registrations was particularly important to those in Southern Europe and South & Central America, with over 62% of registrations from these regions paid for in this way.
- Northern Europeans were most likely to pay for their own registration, with 27% of the North America Respondents paying this way.

The number anticipating paying for registration themselves next year was 23% compared to 19.5% last year. This increase came disproportionately from NE, AP and NA respondents.

There were wide variations by region, with NE, AP, NA and SCA respondents far more likely to anticipate paying for their own registrations than those from SE and EE, who were more likely to predict registration being paid for by industry.

Congress attendance and future intentions

32.7% of respondents indicated they were very likely to come to ESC Congress in Barcelona in 2014, and 42.2% quite likely.


This compares poorly to last year, when 52% of attendees interviewed indicated they would be very likely to attend and 34% said they were quite likely.

Again, the drop in those saying they were very likely to come was much higher in some regions than others. NA figures dropped by 23.6% and AP by 24.8%.

Reasons to attend: most important factors:


The reasons for attending the congress were fairly stable from last year. However, whereas Munich as a location was cited by only 21% of respondents last year, Amsterdam as a location was an important factor for over 31% of this year's attendees.



Which four factors were most important in your decision to attend the congress this year?


33% of attendees interviewed last year indicated, if required to fund their own place they would be very likely to attend the ESC conference next year with 27% quite likely.

This year, the proportion very likely to attend if self funding fell to 21.4%, this decline maybe attributable to lower levels of satisfaction with the conference.





The ESC website and emails were the most common way of hearing about the conference. 21% of non members heard through industry, compared to 8.9% of ESC members.


Websites used regularly in professional practice



Respondents mentioned literally hundreds of different sources, however 3 dominated: the ESC, theheart.org and PubMed.

Younger respondents were more likely to use PubMed and less likely to use the ESC website (30.7% of under 30s compared to 45.4% of over 61s).

Journals used regularly in professional practice



4 journals dominated: the EHJ, JACC, Circulation and New England Journal of Medicine. If we assumed mentions of ESC referred to the EHJ, this would indicate a larger share for this journal. Confusion may indicate issues around branding.

Sources of information - social media

Respondents often indicated they used Facebook in response to this question, with Linkedin and Twitter also used to a lesser extent.



IT HIGHLIGHT

Wi-Fi

The Wi-Fi infrastructure was sized based on last year's experience and figures. About 90 arrays were installed for the event, for a total of 720 antennas all over the congress centre.

The total internet bandwidth available for the Wi-Fi users was 2 Gb/s.

A peak of **9 873** simultaneous connected devices was reached on Monday 2nd September at around 11h00.

There was a total of **24 636** unique devices connected over 5 days with 54% of smartphones and 18 % of tablets.

For information 72% of those smartphones were iPhones and 24% were under Android.

Self Registration and Self Printing (badges and certificates)

This year again, participants had the possibility to self-register on site through **4** self registration stations at the main registration desk, and they could print their badge on site on **10** self badge printing stations.

Webcasts

A new supplier was in charge of the "Presentation Management System" this year. A very interesting feature of the whole solution was the webcast production. All sessions were automatically recorded (if copyright given by speaker), and uploaded into the Congress 365 platform.

The webcast format is now pure video (H264), and encoding is processed in order to store 3 qualities (SD 360p, HD 720p, FHD 1080p), for a total size of 2 TO.

The advantage of video format (as opposed as previous "flash application"), is the ability to stream over the internet (VoD) but also to play those files standalone on any devices.

Also the system was able to send video flow for live streaming. 2 live stream channels were implemented (stack on Amazon Cloud Formation) for diffusion on the ESC web site.

CITY MARKETING

I amsterdam marketing worked on a city marketing project to enhance the visibility of the ESC Congress 2013 for the delegates and also for the local partners. Various initiatives had been discussed and put in practice by a dedicated team as follows:

> At the Airport

At Schiphol Airport:

- 75 LCD screens spread over the all 6 piers at the Airport and 63 LCD screen spread across Schiphol Plaza (the very heart of the airport) showed still images: Amsterdam welcoming the ESC Congress 2013
- Screens above all luggage belts played a short welcome to Amsterdam video. The video was made by I amsterdam with the input of the ESC.
- Outside the airport's main entrance (opposite the taxi rank and bus stations), a 74m2 television screen played the video during the congress days.







A dedicated ESC Congress cycling track linking the city centre to the RAI Congress centre was created with the support of the municipality.



At the congress centre

I amsterdam Welcome Square in the main entrance of the RAI Congress Centre with welcome volunteers providing city information to delegates.



> City Grant

- A City Grant was given to be used for the expenses related to social events
- Free rental of the renowned Rijksmuseum for the President's dinner

Public Transport Network

The Welcome video was also shown on the TV screens of the 155 trams travelling daily

In collaboration with GVB (the Dutch Public Transport Network company) an additional tram (Line number 4) was added to increase the capacity on the public transport network
